HVCC Faculty Fears that Administration Cares More About Admission Rates than Quality of Education

Back in August, the Executive Board of the Hudson Valley Community College Faculty Association, Inc. voted unanimously to begin consideration of a resolution of "no confidence" in HVCC President Roger Ramsammy. This followed his decision to ignore official SUNY policy on Covid-19 vaccinations for students and his failure and subsequent refusal to discuss the matter with the Faculty Association, which sparked numerous concerns from members.

The Board had also noted a number of other concerns that faculty had brought up about the President's leadership and management style. A survey was issued to the faculty asking about their confidence in President Ramsammy and allowed for comments about such. Around 9 in 10 respondents disapproved of his leadership. Multiple pages of comments

Hudson Valley Community College's men's and women's soccer teams had its season closer game on Wednesday, October 19 at HVCC's Outdoor Athletic Complex. Both teams were defeated by Onondaga that afternoon.

The doubleheader was started by the women's teams and HVCC's Vikings fell behind early against Onondaga's Lazers. The Vikings lost the first three of the game's goals but were able to put pressure on the opposing defense after. Melissa Cole (9) had sent a medium-to-long range pass towards the center of the field and Marilyn Decker (7) ultimately scored.

The Onondaga women's soccer team won the game 4-1 and the Vikings were able to finish the regular season with a 5-8-1 record.

The Vikings earned the No. 9 seed in the 2022 National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Region 3 Tournament.

In the past, Hudson Valley Community College had an E-Sports & Gaming Club that utilized the Game Room space for its meetings, events and as a general hangout spot.

Located on the ground floor in the Siek Campus Center at HVCC, the Game Room now has computers set up for student accounts as well as wide screen TVs on opposite sides of the room.

Students connect their devices to the TV to stream and share games with others. Typical games that they offer are Super Smash Bros., Jackbox Party Pack and Mario Kart.

While an official gaming club isn't being established, the friend group that consistently uses the Game Room likes to host a number of things each Tuesday.

Kaylee Romano, a nursing major in her first semester, says, "I feel like the game room really unifies students. We don't have a club with an advisor or anything, but we do use Discord to organize ourselves and plan events.

Some things I love about the game room TV screens is that they allow us to connect our computers, gaming devices and even lets us mirror our phone screens. They also have basic apps like YouTube and Netflix, but they require students to log in with their personal ac-

With freedom comes responsibility, and so unfortunately it's only natural that people abuse their privileges.

Romano continues, "Some group was playing Call of Duty and an inappropriate gamer tag had popped up, meaning someone tried to connect to the TV with a racial slur as their display name.

The TV remotes were temporarily restricted after this incident was reported to HVCC Public Safety, and we're also not allowed to play M-rated games anymore like Call of Duty.

I think that the school's giving

us a great privilege to be able to use this space for gaming with their TV screens, and people should be respectful to others.

There's also been issues about people not cleaning up for themselves, leaving food and garbage around for others to pick up.

I definitely think the game room is a safe space save for the occasional trolls or personal drama being brought to the group. I'm happy it was brought back."

Hudson Valley Community College's e-sports teams play a number of games including Call of Duty Warzone 1 and 2, Rocket League, Cold War, Fortnite, Valorant, Rainbow Six Siege and more. The teams apparently play from home and plan to have their own space in Fall

Caleb Tollisen, a digital media major, says, "It's hypocritical for HVCC to allow M-rated games in their official e-sports but we're suddenly not allowed to play Black Ops 2 to campus.

It used to be that we all in the E-Sports & Gaming Club would bring in our own monitors and set them up around a table for tournaments and things. That way we had complete control over who was using what

device, and if people wanted to troll it'd be a lot more contained than a big message in the middle of the screen saying someone with an inappropriate name is trying to connect to the TV."

Tollisen typically hosts the events and games that people in the game room participate in, including "Mafia."

His upcoming Smash Ultimate Tournament will be on October 27 at 12:30 pm and includes a \$100 prize with a \$5 bracket entry fee, waived if you bring your own setup. It's encouraged that participants bring their own controllers. This event is independent from any official HVCC club or e-sports.

described his leadership style as "aggressive, autocratic and rules by fear."

This sentiment was apparent in multiple conversations with faculty members, who requested to stay off the record for fear of retaliation. Faculty members even allege that the President and administration scream at them behind closed doors.

In addition to the SUNY Vaccine Policy and the President's leadership style, members of faculty also take issue with the direction the President is taking the school in. One of the main issues is with how funds are being spent at the school. They feel that the administration is more focused on keeping admission numbers up than providing a high quality education once they've arrived on campus. With retiring instructors not being replaced and reduced library hours, where students are lined up most days waiting for the library to open, members of the faculty feel that funds could be better spent there than on things such as the new putting green in front of the campus center.

Senior Vice Chancellor & General Counsel for SUNY, Anta Cissé-Green, and the SUNY Student Assembly also took issue with the administration's reversal of SUNY vaccine policy. The SUNY Student Assembly requested presidential evaluation outlined in the SUNY Governance Handbook be considered. Cissé-Green emailed President Ramsammy a "letter of non-compliance" which directed the administration to comply with SUNY policy and

to update their website and communications reflecting this change.

"As has been discussed at length with the Presidents across the SUNY System, compliance with the Policy is a critical factor in ensuring

the health and safety of our campuses. This is not an action that we take lightly as we deeply understand the impact this pandemic has had on our SUNY students and the other 63 campuses are working close-

pliance as a result," Cissé-Green plained.

A vote of no confidence in the President by the Faculty Association is not a foregone conclusion. What the faculty seems to want most is to have their voices heard and considered, and to cool down what they feel is

an aggressive environment. The President has been holding more open forums and events where students and faculty alike can share their input, but some members of the faculty view this as "face-saving," stating that many of these events occur

during

riods. In to inqui-PHOTO BY JIM PARMELEE about these issues, a spokesperson for the President replied, "The college's administration has had a collaborative relationship with the Faculty Association for decades, and it continues to have discussions with the association's leadership in an effort to partner in good faith and address concerns. Though the past few years have brought their share of changes and challenges, the college has continued to break new ground and make significant progress, even throughout the pandemic. We plan to continue to make every effort to work together, as one campus community, to advance the college, broaden services and increase opportunities for our students and many partners."

The Faculty Association must first vote among its broader membership to hold the vote of no confidence before the actual vote is taken. If approved, a recommendation of resignation may accompany the vote.

HVCC Foundation's 2022 Gala Raises Over \$100,000 for New ATEC Building

On Friday, October 14th, 2022, I was afforded the privilege of attending Hudson Valley's 2022 gala honoring HVCC alumni and former trustee, Don Fane, and his contributions to HVCC's intriguing new project. Surrounding me in the breathtaking venue of Franklin Place were Hudson Valley Faculty, alumni, and sponsors. I, being one of only three students on a guest list of almost 300, was blown away by how lucky I was to be there. It was hard not to feel lucky, given the things I got to learn about and the people I got to speak with.

During my time at the gala, I was informed about how right now in our country, we're experiencing a massive shortage in trained technicians and skilled trades. "... Throughout the United States, there is 11.4 million open jobs in the skilled trades right now," Explained President Ramsammy during his opening speech, "... Hudson Valley has always been a solution to [all of] it ... Change; We need to become the center of that. "

In order to combat the demand for technical and skilled trade jobs, Hudson Valley has taken on a project that will build a brand-new, state of the art center on campus - the Applied Technology Education Center, otherwise known as the ATEC building.

This building and its endeavors will help create new

programs, as well as expand current ones, allowing for a higher capacity of students (an estimated 200% increase in enrollment for these specialized programs) to address current urgent needs within trade industries. HVCC plans to offer certifications and workforce training programs in a plethora of fields such as welding, cybersecurity, mechatronics, plumbing, automotive (including autonomous vehicle tech), artificial intelligence, data analytics, electrician trades, and so much more.

Some of the new labs the facility plans to offer include a pipefitting and welding lab, a robotics lab, electric vehicle lab, industrial processing labs, and smart technology labs. On top of this, the facility is planned to be built as a zero-carbon facility, revolving around energy efficiency and sustainability.

"With this new building, we can actually build something that will be functional by the time it is done," President Ramsammy stated.

The ability to have the building ready for use will fast-track students into jobs that are urgently needed not just in the state, but in the country as well. While the price tag for the ATEC building sits at \$75 million dollars, the sponsors of the gala raised over \$100,000 to put towards the new building, a very generous and admirable amount that is sure to help jumpstart the efforts towards the exciting new complex.



native Paraguay, and closed with three pieces by world-renowned composer songwriter
Augustin Barrios. She provided background about each of
the seven pieces she played.
Several of the pieces required
non-standard retuning of the
guitar. Her performance conveyed warm emotions while simultaneously playing a distinct

melody and accompaniment. The performance ended with a 15-minute Q&A session where she conveyed amusing stories about hiding from her music teacher when she was seven, deciding to practice when she entered a competition to win a new guitar at age 12, and the loss and recovery of her guitar when it was stolen from

her car and sold. When asked why she decided to pursue a career in music, her reply was, "I can't do anything else." HVCC Cultural Affairs and the Classical Guitar Society of Upstate New York cosponsored this performance. The fall program has four more free live music programs covering gypsy swing band music, blues guitar, traditional Celtic music, and Latin American music from the 1920s to 1940s.



of West's rants. He's often convinced that someone is trying to separate him from his children, while the only one doing so is himself with his outbursts.

After West assigned Davidson the moniker "Skete," it didn't take long before his fans took to harassing Davidson to the point where he eventually deleted his Instagram. Davidson had admitted himself into a psychiatric trauma unit shortly after. Afterwards, West claimed he "ran Skete off the gram."

He later made another Instagram post that read, "Ask Pete how those tattoos of my kids doing in the trauma unit." His posts jeering Davidson were off-putting to fans as West himself has been to psych wards.

On the day of the Super Bowl, Kanye West trended on Twitter above the actual football event itself on account of his destructive public rants about his family. Shortly following this incident, West began to promote his upcoming album "Donda 2." The catch was that it wouldn't be released on streaming services, and would be exclusive to his own invention, the "Yeezy Stem Player." The main idea was that if you wanted to listen to the sequel to West's 2021 release Donda, you'd have to fork over \$200 first.

Following a disaster of a listening party, during which the performers' headsets stopped working halfway through, "Donda 2" released on the stem player in a horribly unfinished state. The songs were poorly mixed with many of the vocals being muffled next to a serenade of lazily-composed weak mumbled over the beat as a placeholder.

To this day, the album still remains unfinished, and given West's track record for teasing an album sequel and scrapping it midway through, it's unlikely that we'll ever hear a finished version of "Donda 2." Those who did buy a stem player lost \$200 to listen to an album that would never be finished.

About two weeks prior to this publication, West tweeted about going "death con 3 on Jewish people" among other things. There is a belief that Jewish people are an illuminati-type group in control of the media which West appears to be supporting.

Shortly before this incident, Kanye made headlines for wearing a shirt that read "White Lives Matter" at his Yeezy fashion show, and had many of his black models wear the same

Many people's first instinct was to assume West was trolling, but it didn't take long before West revealed that he was in fact not joking. He said that the Black Lives Matter movement was "a scam," and that the shirts were in protest of that.

Protesting the organization by forcing young black folks to wear a seemingly pro-white catchphrase in front of a huge audience wasn't the profound nor groundbreaking movement West thought it was going to be. It's said that there's no American crisis threatening the human rights of white folks, so they don't need protection when they already have it.

On top of the statement

spokesman Tucker Carlson backstage during a Yeezy product unveiling and took part in his interview.

The pattern of West catering to people who are known to be problematic has placed himself in that same position of notoriety. A week or so after the "death con" tweet incident, West guest starred for an interview on the Drink Champs podcast, during which he made claims that George Floyd died from fentanyl and that Derek Chauvin's knee "wasn't even on his neck like that." Floyd did indeed have fentanyl in his system, but numerous reports from those who performed the autopsy confirm that his death was not the result of an overdose. West's response appeared to undermine Derek Chauvin's guiltiness.

While Kanye West used to perform more introspective songs about disproportionate black conviction rates and other matters of racial justice, he's chosen to appeal to a different audience these days.

At the end of the day, there's nobody who exemplifies the idea of separating the art from the artist better than Kanye West. He's made huge waves in the music industry as a whole, and is one of the most critically praised and influential artists of the past 20 years. He's made so much progress for the black community, with many of his songs highlighting the issue of systemic racism in America, but some fans think he's taking a step backwards.

The title of one of his old songs is prophetic seeing as how at this point in time West has become a "Black Skinhead." His music has made a huge impact on fan's lives including my

Dahmer - Monster: The Jeffrey Dahmer Story (2022)

Netflix's true crime drama "Dahmer," subtitled "Monster: The Jeffrey Dahmer Story" is a retelling of the horrific spree of real-life murders committed by Jeffrey Dahmer in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Evan Peters, portraying the titular Dahmer, delivers a bone-chilling and deeply disturbing performance of the notorious killer. He does a magnificent job at highlighting the true lowest depths of humanity. However, the show isn't loved by all. In fact, the families of Dahmer's victims don't like the show one bit. In spite of Peters' impeccable acting, and the show's very high production value, there's a strong argument that it should have never been made.

"I don't see how they can do that," says Shirley Hughes, mother of Dahmer victim Tony Hughes to The Guardian. "I don't see how they can use our names and put stuff out like that out there." Netflix, money-grubbing as they are, made no attempt to contact the families of the victims before Dahmer was greenlit. As a result, the scenes that were broadcast to millions of households across the world were traumatizing for many still-grieving relatives and friends. For many people, this is the most glaring ethical flaw in Dahmer's production, and I can't say I disagree. However, in the ninth episode of the series, Netflix seems to contradict themselves.

Episode nine highlights how Jeffrey Dahmer was wrongly idolized by many, how his story was turned into a cash-grab spooky Halloween headline, and how western media and pop culture essentially made a mockery of the victims and their families by doing so. Netflix chastises this behavior in a very objective manner in the episode, which raises some confusion. Are they not doing the same thing by creating such a show, no less, just in time for Halloween?

The impression I get is a very insincere one. Netflix wants you to think that they care, and that they wish to highlight how much damage the publicity of the killings inflicted on the families, but at the end of the day, they're contributing to the same exact issue. The irony of the situation would be almost tragic, if it weren't driven by capitalist corporate greed.

That being said, however, I did personally find enjoyment in watching the show. In watching the ten episode miniseries, you find yourself feeling deeply for the victims and their families, and their individuality is highlighted in a way that true crime series' don't often do. The show goes out of its way to remind you that each victim was

a human being, with their own life and path rather than just a number on a serial killer's body count. The accusations that the show is "glorifying" Dahmer are largely false. None of Dahmer's ten episodes make an effort to romanticize his sick mind, nor unravel its "complexities" like true crime media has done. However, this doesn't absolve the show of all guilt. The fact that it portrays real-life murders and their corresponding court cases with such unapologetic realism has emotionally re-traumatizing consequences for those involved.

I have mixed feelings about the show as I certainly thought it was good from a production standpoint, but Netflix's care-



lessness in letting something so harmful for the still-grieving families see the light of day can't be ignored. In spite of Evan Peters' career-defining performance as the titular serial killer, it's hard to walk away from the show without the takeaway that innocent people were exploited in its creation.



Día de Los Muertos Exhibit

The Mexican tradition of Día de Los Muertos (Day of the Dead) is celebrated on November second. Altars like the one in the Marvin Library are set up in public places. While these altars usually don't honor particular individuals, Mexican families that observe the tradition will set up private altars dedicated to deceased family members or close friends. Some families may start the holiday on the evening of November first – setting up an altar at the

grave site of the dead and staying the night praying and chatting about them. Many families will set up altars in their homes instead of visiting the grave site.

Día de Muertos, a joyful celebration of the dead, is thought to have originated in indigenous Mexican traditions. When the Spanish arrived, the Catholic Church appropriated the holiday and introduced religious symbols into the holiday. Others think it may be more Southern European in origin. The observation of the holiday usually follows the November first All Saints Day. The typical altar will have candles,

flowers, pictures of the people they are honoring, food and drinks the person enjoyed, and religious symbols. The traditional flower is the large, yellow Aztec marigold. The altars often contain papel picado (tissue paper, and now plastic, with cut-out patterns); calaveras de azúcar (sugar skulls), often decorated with names on the skull, and; personal items of



Scalaveras de azúcar (sugar skulls) are often given to children as gifts, but are not meant to be edible.



4. "The Blair Witch Project" (1999)



Pumpkin Muffins With Cream Cheese Filling Recipe

Happy fall! Looking for a fun pumpkin recipe? I got you!

This recipe will make twelve muffins. If you are big fan of Starbucks pumpkin muffins, these are very similar!

Ingredients:

- 1 cup of all-purpose flour
- ½ cup of cake flour
- 1 tsp of baking powder
- 1 tsp of baking soda
- 1/2 cup of sugar
- 1 ½ tsp of ground cinnamon
- 1 ½ tsp of pumpkin pie spice
- ¼ tsp ground nutmeg • ¼ tsp of ground cloves
- 1 egg
- 1 cup of pumpkin puree
- ¼ cup of melted butter
- 1 tsp of vanilla extract
- ½ cup of milk
- Cream Cheese Filling:
- 4oz of cream cheese (at room temperature)
- 2 tbsp of granulated sugar
- 1 tsp of corn starch
- 1 tsp of flour
- 1 tsp of milk
- ½ tsp of vanilla extra

- 1.) Preheat your oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit.
- 2.) Use a hand mixer or a stand mixer, cream the cream cheese, sugar, vanilla extract, flour, and cornstarch together for two minutes. Make sure it is creamy and smooth and set it aside.
- **3.)** Grab a separate bowl and whisk the sugar and melted butter together. Next add in your vanilla, pumpkin puree, and egg until combined. Following this, fold in flour, baking soda, baking powder, and only a ¼ cup of milk for now. Lastly, add your seasonings and the remaining milk until it is combined
- **4.)** Pour your pumpkin batter into muffin liners, but not too much. Fill a piping bag with the cream cheese filling and pipe the filling into the middle of each muffin, do about a tablespoon.
- **5.)** Bake the muffins for 20-25

Winning a game requires


member standing. Each match is broken into a number of rounds and with each round the playable game area gets smaller and smaller due to the ring.



When we arrived we noticed that Broome had quickly realized Olivia Skystald was not


