



SPRING BUDGET APPROVAL FOR NEW CLUBS

As stated in the January 22nd Student Senate meeting, Treasurer Lukas Donaghue will present starter budgets for clubs started last semester that requested preliminary funds.

These include the AC/DC Welding Club, HVCC Book Club, Cheerleading & Pep Squad, and Psychology Club.

Approval by vote is currently scheduled for February 12th. Club budgets for the 2024-25 academic year will be decided later in the spring semester by a committee of Student Senators.

For student organizations who did not put in a Spring 2024 budget, per the Student Senate Bylaws "any individual, club, or academic department may request Special Projects Funding once per academic year".

Special Projects Funding can support newly established or existing clubs with a set initiative or trip in mind.

Written requests should be submitted to the Senate by a club advisor and must gain a majority vote in session for Special Projects Funds to be awarded.

529 COLLEGE SAVINGS ACCOUNTS ELIGIBLE FOR ROTH IRA ROLLOVER

Effective 2024, the SECURE 2.0 Act expanding retirement savings options includes a provision to rollover 'left-over' college funds into a Roth IRA account-seemingly avoiding taxation

Yet murky language may not have your financial institutions and advisors on board.

Historically, anyone with funds remaining in their 529 account after finishing higher education are left with two options: withdraw unqualified and be heavily taxed, or roll the funds into another 529 account, often for a relative such as a younger sibling or your own child.

With the introduction of Roth IRA rollovers, in theory, this money can go directly toward the original beneficiary's retirement.

This is preferable to withdrawing and then starting another savings account, as non-qualified 529 withdrawals incur a 10% federal tax. In New York State, they can be subject to state and local taxes on top of that.

Rollovers may be tax and penalty free if the following conditions are met (non-exhaustive list):

-The 529 account has been held by a beneficiary for 15 years (presumably, the same beneficiary)

-The amount transferred to your Roth IRA each year cannot exceed annual limitations applying to the beneficiary (calculated based on filing status, income and age)

-A lifetime cap of \$35,000 from a 529 account into Roth IRAs must not be exceeded

The excitement of new financial opportunities cannot overshadow the necessity of your due diligence. Contact your financial institution and advisor to see how the 529 provisions in SECURE 2.0 may apply.

The elusive Gameboy Advance cult-classic Mother 3 is long overdue for an international release. It was released in Japan in 2006 before quickly being largely forgotten about by Nintendo, and an official English translation was never made. Fortunately, a well-polished fan translation has made the game available to play for Western audiences since 2008.

In the nearly 18 years since the game's release, Mother 3 has garnered worldwide acclaim and attention, with many citing it as one of the most powerful stories they've experienced in any medium, generating tons of online discussion to this day. Contemporary indie RPGs such as Undertale and Omori take heavy cues from Mother 3 and its predecessor Mother 2 (called "EarthBound" in English-speaking countries).

So why would Nintendo deliberately choose to withhold such an in-demand game from the rest of the world?

Some believe that it's because of the game's controversial subject matter and its overt political themes. Nintendo of America's "family friendly" image doesn't exactly line up with depictions of animal cruelty, fascism, communism, and the condemnation of capitalist greed. Add the Magypsies, Mother 3's race of ancient magical drag queens to the equation, and you've got yourself a fine list of hot-button topics in American politics.

The story is set in an isolated village called Tazmily, located in the middle of the fictional Nowhere Islands. The people of Tazmily are kind, compassionate, and reliable, and mainly seem concerned with helping each other out. Interestingly, they have no concept of money or private property. Every act of labor is for the sake of their community, and the tight-knit village feels like a big family.

If you're thinking "this sounds like communism," you're absolutely right. However, it may not be the most trueto-life depiction of such a system. It's more of an idealist's view of communism when practiced in a small, secluded, tight-knit society.

Regardless, such a topic would be sure to pick up its fair share of critics if the game were made widely available in the West, but the political analogies don't stop there. The peace of Tazmily is threatened when a man named Fassad, the ambassador of the mysterious "Pigmask" empire, comes to visit.

He introduces the villagers to the concept of currency, and declares that "an era of money is about to begin". The villagers are initially very confused by this proposition, and very few listen to him. The curious few however, find themselves intrigued by Fassad's speech, and stick around to see what he has to offer. Fassad gives these few villagers television sets, which he refers to as "happy boxes," and insists that true happiness will come from having one of them in your home.

By this point in the story, it's easy to see what's happening. Fassad is weakening the unity of Tazmily by introducing its populace to materialist concepts. Much like our real world, the people of Tazmily want these "happy boxes" because they are told that they want them. Prior to Fassad's visit, they had no concept of excess luxury items.

After a four year time-skip, the village of Tazmily is nearly unrecognizable. The forests have been replaced with highways and train stations, and the rustic cabins and cozy shacks that once filled up the village have been replaced with refurbished, gaudy houses full of expensive luxury items.

Rather than working for the good of one another, the villagers now spend their days slaving away in a factory implemented by Fassad. However, they convince themselves that this shallow, empty lifestyle is worth it, because after their shifts, they're free to go to "Club Titiboo" and drink their nights away. The once-kind and compassionate villagers are now very outwardly rude to the player, and much of their dialogue is concerned

with their paychecks, buying expensive things to make their neighbors jealous, and being subservient to the Pigmask empire.

Interestingly, these "Pigmasks," are designed to resemble the iconic stormtroopers from Star Wars, only their helmets are in the vague shape of a pig's head. Perhaps it's rather on-the-nose that a corrupt government organization that enforces the law of the land would be dressed like pigs.

Towards the end of the game's story, the ripple effect of the fascist Pigmask empire has nearly completely eroded the once-peaceful village and its values, with most of the cast abandoning Tazmily for the hyper-industrial "New Pork City".

It's eventually revealed that the village of Tazmily was only established in the first place as a refuge from an ending world, making it a communist fantasy brought to life in a time of dire circumstances.

However, the eventual defeat of the Pigmasks at the hands of the player character leaves some ambiguous hope for the future. Is it possible for them to build back the tranquil lifestyle the villagers once had, or have they been permanently stained by the evils of industrialization?

I believe that Mother 3 shows its players that an idealist's view of a communist society cannot function as intended while existing in a world dominated by money. The inextinguishable flame of capitalist greed burned away the possibility of a prosperous communist society long ago.

However, this doesn't mean that we, as citizens of the most hyper-industrialized nation on Earth, should live our lives based around the shallow concepts of wealth and materialism. The inherent evils of capitalism may not be apparent to all, but the greed spawned from a culture that surrounds consumerism keeps us from making true, honest connections with one another, and suppresses the love that's so abundant within us all.

While a working communist society may be nothing more than a fairy tale, we should strive to live our lives based around human connection, not making a few extra dollars.

show came quite close.



The writing highlights different sides our characters show different people, and the almost co-dependent nature that comes with their relationship.






