Kevin Waltz, a 2022 graduate of Hudson Valley, recently announced his campaign for New York's 20th congressional district.

Waltz's push for the Republican nomination was secured when Liz Joy, the Republican candidate for the 20th district in 2022, decided to not run again. Waltz currently has the endorsement of the Albany, Rensselaer, Schenectady, and Colonie Republican Committees.

Waltz is a former Criminal Justice student who served as Editor-In-Chief of The Hudsonian. As Editor-In-Chief, he broke the news regarding cameras in the classroom and criticized the white supremacist group Patriot Front.

After graduating Hudson Valley, Waltz pursued criminal justice at the University of Albany. He graduated in 2023 with his Bachelor of Arts. While at the University of Albany, he was Vice President of both the Albany College Republicans and the University's Turning Point USA chapter, a rightwing nonprofit.

The Turning Point USA chapter re-

ceived backlash following their invitation of Ian Haworth to the University. Haworth, a conservative spokesperson and journalist, is known for his speeches on college campuses.

His appearance at the University of Albany was met with large protests. Students, some of whom associated with the Young Democratic Socialists of America and College Democrats, protested the event so heavily it was shut down by campus police.

The source of the protest was a tweet by Haworth: "Does trans visibility mean we can see the penis or not?" on International Transgender Day Of Visibility.

Afterwards, Haworth tweeted the following regarding the accusations of transphobia: "And by 'openly transphobic' they mean someone who believes in biology and opposes genital mutilation being carried out on children..." Waltz accused the protesters of breaking school policy in their protest and hoped the college would hold them accountable.

Waltz, now a Albany Law School student, continues his work for the conservative cause under Republican Assemblyman Keith Brown.

New York's 20th congressional district is currently represented by Paul Tonko. Tonko has been the district's representative since 2013. The congressional district includes most of the capital region, encompassing Albany, Saratoga, and Schenectady counties, and portions of Rensselaer county.

Tonko is a member of the Democratic Party and the district is seen as heavily Democratic. The borders of the district are due to change as the redistricting process is finalized. Governor Kathy Hochul has signed into law a new congressional map, but it has yet to go into effect.

Commentary: Waltz's campaign is a longshot. At 25 years old, he is the youngest opponent Tonko has faced to date and represents a whole new generation of Americans. In such a Democratic district it seems Waltz has no hope of winning. While his chances might be slim, there's no way to be certain. This Nov. 5, anything can be

Waltz did not respond to The Hudsonian's request for comment.

However, we're at least fortunate to live in a country with systems in place to be heard by our representatives. It's just a matter of learning to

navigate the system. As Vice President of the Student Senate, I've become well-versed in the government on our campus, and I encourage all of you to see it firsthand.

The meetings of all our governing bodies are open to the public, so you're welcome to stop by anytime!

The Student Senate meetings every Monday classes are held at 3 p.m. in CTR 202. If you want to better understand campus life or connect with student leaders, this is the place to start.

The Academic Senate, per their website, represents the faculty, administration, staff, and students. It "receives proposals, suggestions, and concerns from the campus community", deliberates them, and forwards their recommendations to the President of the College or Board of Trustees.

They meet every month on a Monday at 2:15 p.m. in the BTC Meeting Rooms. Their next meetings are on March 25th and April 22nd.

The Faculty Student Association (FSA) is a not-for-profit corporation established to handle the college's "auxiliary services" including Student Activities, athletics, and food services.

They meet every month on a Monday at 3 p.m. in GUN 148 (the Board Room). Their next meetings are on April 8th and May 13th.

The Board of Trustees governs the entire college, and is composed of 10 members. To represent the interests of the state and local community, four are appointed by the Governor, five are appointed by Rensselaer County, and the student body elects one student to be their representative.

They meet every month on a Tuesday at 4:30 p.m. in the Board Room. Their next meetings are on March 26th and April 23rd.

You can access the bylaws, meeting info, and who to contact for all of these groups at any time by internet search.

When I first joined Student Senate, I didn't know what to expect. However, during my time here, the way I perceive the world has changed.

I've learned firsthand how much power and influence each of us holds, and how to use it. The network built with students, faculty, and administration is invaluable, and I will apply the lessons I've learned here for the rest of my life.

ALZHEIMER'S DETECTABLE

THROUGH NEW BLOOD TEST

Doctors are now able to test for Alzheimer's through a commercial blood

test with 95 percent accuracy.

The blood test detects 'P-tau217', a hallmark protein of Alzheimer's disease. For decades, these abnormal proteins have been observed in lumbar punctures and brain scans of Alzheimer's patients, even before symptoms begin to present.

This new research and test out of the University of Gothenburg shows blood with traces of P-tau217 correlates with 'clumps' of the protein in the brain, the suspected cause of symptoms.

The new detection method may aid preventative research and disease outcomes.

Swedish doctors are incorporating P-tau217 testing in the Alzheimer's diagnostic process. The test is yet to be launched in the United States.

Alzheimer's affects more than 6 million people in America. According to Alzheimer's Research UK, Alzheimer's affects about 1-in-9 people over 65 years old.

SUNY ADVOCACY DAY: NOBLE INTENTIONS, POOR EXECUTION

STUDENTS FIGHT FOR DISABILITY PROGRAM FUNDING AT THE STATE CAPITOL

At the NYS Capitol, every Tuesday is advocacy day. Legislatures are constantly bombarded by people who want to see change. On Monday, Feb. 26, it was our turn.

I had the pleasure of attending SUNY Empowerment Day, where college students from all over the state gathered at the Capitol to advocate for the funding of resources and programs to help students with disabilities, looking to see an increase to \$15M.

The highlight of the day only occurred because the schedule was delayed, waiting on students from CUNY and presenters. During the wait, the Student President of Binghamton University, Elisheva Ezor, led a Q&A with the audience. Students from the crowd got up to the podium and shared their experiences and unique struggles with their disability.

One shared how she felt when people made assumptions about her ability, and another shared how it took her 20 years to get diagnosed because every doctor dismissed her. Listening to their lived experiences was moving, forcing a deep empathy from each audience member.

It united the students there in a way no planned speech could have, and I believe captured the purpose of the day better than anything on the schedule.

When the CUNY students arrived, Dr. Chris Rosa took over as host. He's the President & CEO of The Viscardi Center, based on Long Island. According to their website, the Viscardi Center is "a network of nonprofits that educate, employ, and empower children and adults with disabilities."

Rosa created Empowerment Day just 7 years ago to bring attention to

these students who are too often overlooked. It's been growing ever since. He was a force of nature, rallying the crowd after they had been waiting for over an hour with his mere presence.

Many legislators spoke at the event. Rosa, who was in a motorized wheelchair, would briefly thank each speaker and introduce the next one, but many forgot to move the microphone back down to an accessible height for Rosa

While this was primarily an oversight in the event's organization and was no one person's fault, it was a fitting metaphor for the resources NY State is providing students with diverse abilities and special needs.

It practically became a 'bit'; a member of the crowd would walk up to the podium to move the mic each time. Dr. Rosa was gracious and made light of it, but the irony that this occurred during an event to support students with disabilities was not missed.

Student and community leaders also spoke at the event. SUNY SA President & Student Trustee, Alexander Ruiz, spoke passionately and eloquently in typical fashion. He, and many others, made the point that \$15 million divided between over 94,000 disabled students in NY State colleges is about \$150 per student, a paltry sum compared to the support most colleges are desperately lacking.

Other speakers included Deputy Commissioner Ceylane Meyers-Ruff, CUNY Student Trustee Salimatou Doumbouya, SUNY Disability Ambassador Kaitlin Anzalone, Chairperson of the CUNY Coalition for Students with Disabilities (CCSD), Leonard Blades, and Mackenzie Gleason, an advocate for students with disabilities at Syracuse University.

They informed us that students with disabilities received a measly \$4 mil-

lion of funding last year, and argued that they should not have to fight this hard to get what everyone has a right to—equal education.

It was clear the event was not given the planning it was due. The printed program was completely inaccurate, didn't include the names of the speakers, and had no QR code for blind and dyslexic students to scan and read digitally with the accessible software they have on their phones.

The water fountains didn't work,

with no additional speaker. With how few students could hear it, it would've been better if it weren't shown at all.

There was also the disappointing and last-minute change of plan to cancel the rally and gathering on the Million Dollar Staircase. I later heard that people got hurt on the staircase in previous years, and the organizers didn't want too many people crowded in that area, but this begs the question of why it was on the schedule in the first place.

If we can continue to increase promotion and get the event to run smoothly next year, I have high hopes.

THE EYES OF STANLEY PAIN

DOWNLOAD'S ALBUM DOES INDUSTRIAL HORROR RIGHT

An album that can only be described as "audial horror", Download's The Eyes of Stanley Pain is not the type that you'd shuffle on your morning commute.

For this experience, you need a full 71 minutes undisturbed, your finest Walmart LED strips, and the willingness to go someplace entirely "other".

Download formed from Dwayne Goettel and Kevin Crompton of electro-industrial pioneer Skinny Puppy. While their later albums take on a similarly haunting but more accessible and familiar IDM/electronic sound (think Aphex Twin or Boards of Canada), The Eyes of Stanley Pain proudly calls back to its industrial roots.

Industrial takes tools of rock and electronic music and bends them to their breaking point, playing with noise and throwing out the rules of what "sounds nice" to make something mesmerizing.

TV static, squealing feedback, metal grating against metal, anything can be used, and this album uses it all.

Perfectly polished to a rusted, abrasive finish, The Eyes of Stanley Pain takes its grease-streaked hand in yours and holds a shattered mirror to humanity, divinity, and, judging from the number of sampled screams, plenty of pain too.

If you're not into all that flowery artsy crap, start with "Outafter", originally produced as a Skinny Puppy track for cult classic gothic superhero film The Crow.

Upbeat, bouncy, downright danceable while pushing an eerie synth melody behind it, it's perfect for your morning commute if you're a painted

vigilante leaping between rain-soaked The Crow, it is so good.)

If you ARE into that flowery artsy crap, the opening track "Suni C" remains my favorite. Samples of broken speech are interrupted by a frenetic texture of electronic beats, buzzing,

pounding, metallic crunching, snippets of discordant melody, and FNAF 2 ambiance, all hurtling towards some imagined doom.

Distorted, gravelly vocals rise up for safe ears..." It is malicious, fright- audial art that you won't forget.

Just as you can't take any more and skyscrapers (Libby's PSA: please watch start to put on some Death Grips to calm down: "Wait...Wait..." The beat falls away and the voice turns almost soothing, "You are the word...You are pure... You are everything or anything that you want to be...You are everything!...."

Then it fades away too, and you are left floating amidst cool, breathy harmonies, finally at peace. It almost sounds like a depiction of religious ecstasy, and it gives me chills every time.

If you want true industrial slop (in the best way!), try "Fire This Ground"part of Skinny Puppy's collab album with Throbbing Gristle, Puppy Gristle. Throbbing Gristle actually coined the term "industrial music", describing it as "anti-music". While "Fire This Ground" may indeed be the antithesis of any chart-topper you've ever heard: lurching rhythm and squealing chopshop tones will put you in a trance either way.

Genesis P-Orridge of Throbbing Gristle also contributes vocals to "H Sein Influence" and "Separate", lending their icy voice to these sample-ridden tracks that I can only describe as "horror movie in a blender".

From the dripping, ghostly synth over the sound of literal spattering water in "Base Metal", to the bone-chilling vocals in the titular track, dragging the words "...You were struck by Stanley Pain..." over a wind-battered barren soundscape, each piece adds its own layer to the experience.

If you are into the experimental, the beside you-"You hear distant voices avant-garde, or the just-plain-weird, speaking only to you...Special words The Eyes of Stanley Pain is a work of

the best actor in this film, while the others did a pretty good job.



"Crying in H Mart" is a memoir of indie pop group Japanese Breakfast's lead singer, Michelle Chongmi Zauner.

It's an exploration of grief, cultural identity, and the way certain aspects of life can be much more meaningful and tied to memories; in this case being food.

Michelle Zauner captures memories of her late mother through tastes offered at the Korean-owned chain supermarket, H

Zauner walks us through stages of her life in relation to the development of her bond with her mother, including childhood where parent and child are inseparable, the rebellion and angst of teenagehood, parental disapproval, and internal conflict.

Born in Seoul to a Korean mother and an American father, and raised in Eugene,

Oregon, H Mart depicts cultural nuance and a struggle of identity within Zauner herself as she explores her own heritage.

The book paints a smooth picture of complex topics and manages to capture the whole process beautifully. Such topics include the upbringing that led her onto an artistic path, her relationship with her



parents, her meaningful experiences with friends, and the way she grapples with her mother tongue, Korean.

The development of her bond with her now-husband Peter, and the arduous journey to becoming Japanese Breakfast makes for a relentless but captivating narrative.

After her mother's passing, she tries to reconnect with a part of herself that she feels is gone. That leads to her entrancement with a YouTuber called Maangchi, and a path to acquiring the recipes and skill to make -and revisit- all the varying tastes from her childhood.

It's rare that a book can evoke as many emotions as I have felt while reading "Crying in H Mart". Zauner's unflinching narrative brought me to tears. Not necessarily all because of the sadness and heaviness it carried, but mostly because of how genuine, raw, and relatable everything is.

The book doesn't just memorialize the good. While people usually tend to lean towards remembering the good things about our passed loved ones, Zauner does a great job of balancing out all the bittersweetness of life involving the many tumultuous aspects of her relationship with her mother; which makes the depth of the relationship all the more real.






